Northern Australia - Summary

- New season hay is being made in some parts of the region and is on the market. Supply is limited with a lot of hay being carted into the region from the southern parts of the nation.
- With few crops sown and prevailing dry conditions, there will be limited hay made this season for parts of the region.
- There are some failed crops being made into hay in the region but these a few.
- Securing long term, reliable supplies of quality hay may well be an issue for the north as the year progresses with demand expected to be greater than supply.
- The Government continues to offer subsidies for transport of fodder, moving livestock and water infrastructure to support eligible farmers in NSW affected by drought. Southern Australia - Summary

- Last season's hay is limited in supply and there is low carryover from previous years.
- Parts of the region have experienced a tough finish and crops in these regions are struggling. It is not yet known what will happen with some these crops.
- Some parts of the region that have experienced a tough finish have cut crops early.
- Frosts in the region have damaged some grain crops which are expected to be turned into hay this season.
- New season hay is starting to be made in southern Australia and is starting to come on to the market.
- The Government continues to offer subsidies for transport of fodder, moving livestock and water infrastructure to support eligible farmers in NSW affected by drought. Western Australia - Summary

- Crops are currently 2-3 weeks behind and yields are looking below an average season.
- Some canola will not have the yields so will be made into hay.
- There was a lot of high quality hay made last season and this is reflected in the high price for feed in the region.
- New season hay is being made in the region.
- Yields are down across Western Australia this season and hay supplies are tight.
- The export industry continues to dominate the WA market and is a solid indicator on pricing. Exporters continue to seek out quality hay and as a result, will set the price in the market for quality hay.
